How to find the debate video and send to teachers

- 1. Log in to the Smart School Councils platform using your school details.
- 2. Click on the blue Class Meeting Tool button in the dashboard.
- 3. Click on 'Next Meeting' at the top of the page.
- 4. To get started, click on 'click here' to browse existing questions and options.
- 5. If the debate topic is part of this week's question, it will appear there. Otherwise, click 'Search All' and type in the debate topic you're looking for.

We're going to share reasons for both sides of the debate, then it's up to you to think of the rest!

Endless life means endless opportunities

You might be thinking that an endless life would mean endless opportunities. You could travel the world, learn every language, master every hobby, make friends from every century and never run out of time to achieve your dreams.

Living life without fear

You could say that you would have to fear death or danger. You wouldn't have to worry about ageing or dangerous situations due to your immortality meaning you know nothing will ever end your life.

More people to contribute money and experience

Living forever could mean boredom and lack of purpose

You might be thinking that living forever could mean boredom and lack of purpose. If life never ended, would it start to feel meaningless? Would achievements still feel special if you had unlimited time to reach them?

Living forever could cause emotional challenges

Or you could say that living forever could lead to emotional challenges. Outliving friends and family who were not to living forever would be painful. As well as constantly finding new people to grow close to in order to avoid loneliness. Would relationships still have the same meaning?

A long life doesn't mean a good life

Some argue that extending life does not necessarily guarantee a good quality of life, and longer lifespans could lead to extended periods of poor health or diminished capacities as your body grows older.

Yes

More people with acquired knowledge means movements

Longer life means financial security and opportunity
