#### How to find the debate video and send to teachers

- 1. Log in to the <u>Smart School Councils platform</u> using your school details.
- 2. Click on the blue Class Meeting Tool button in the dashboard.
- 3. Click on 'Next Meeting' at the top of the page.
- 4. To get started, click on 'click here' to browse existing questions and options.
- 5. If the debate topic is part of this week's question, it will appear there. Otherwise, click 'Search All' and type in the debate topic you're looking for.

#### FOR: The internet should be free as it is so important

We're going to share reasons for both sides of the debate, then it's up to you to think of the rest!

#### Internet is essential for modern life so everyone should access it

You might be thinking that the internet is essential for modern life so everyone should access it. The internet is needed for education, healthcare, and finding jobs. By not making it free, we don't give everyone equal opportunities to progress in society and reduce the divide between those who can and can't afford it.

#### You need the internet to stay informed and boost democracy

You could say that without the internet, it would be harder to stay informed and boost democracy. The internet allows people to stay informed, express their opinions, and participate in political and social discussions. If access depends on the ability to pay, only wealthier people may have full access to all the information and to take part in online debates, limiting democracy and freedom of expression.

#### It is limited in so many places which holds some back

According to a UNICEF-ITU report, two-thirds of the world's school-age children (approximately 1.3 billion) lack internet access at home, hindering their educational opportunities.

#### In the UK, many struggle to afford internet access

In the UK, 2.5 million households struggle to afford internet access, and 1 in 14 homes have no access at all, indicating that even in developed nations, internet access is not universally achievable. And with 1 in 10 British people saying they would cut back on food for internet access shows free internet is needed. *(Source: Good Things Foundation, LINK)* 







# AGAINST: The internet should not be free even if it is important

Now let's change positions and consider why you might argue that the internet should not be free even if it is important.



#### If the internet were free, it might be of poor quality

You might be thinking that the internet not being paid for could risk poor quality. If the internet were free, there might be slower speeds, more advertisements might appear in order to use it, or restrictions on which areas can access it.

#### If we are not paying, who will?

Or you could also ask if we are not paying, who will? Internet services require infrastructure, maintenance, and security. If it's free, who covers the cost? Governments? Taxpayers? Private companies?

Can you think of another reason why the internet should not be free even if it is so important?

#### Will the infrastructure support everyone having the internet?

Only 35% of people in developing nations have any form of online access, suggesting that infrastructural challenges may impede the feasibility of providing free internet universally.



#### Will the internet being free mean everyone can access it?



UNESCO reports that in 2022, there were 187 instances of internet shutdowns in 35 countries, raising concerns about governments controlling or restricting internet access, even if it's provided for free. *(Source: UNESCO, LINK)* 

# FactSheet: Should the internet be free as it's so important to the modern world?



Here's six key facts - three on each side - if you'd like to go a little deeper.

#### Yes

#### Belief that the internet is a human right

A global survey by Ipsos found that 83% of internet users believe affordable internet access should be a basic human right. This underscores the widespread perception of the internet as essential for modern life. (Source: *IPSOS*, <u>LINK</u>)

#### Lack of access can reduce inequality and opportunities

According to a UNICEF-ITU report, two-thirds of the world's school-age children (approximately 1.3 billion) lack internet access at home, hindering their educational opportunities. (Source: *UNICEF*, <u>LINK</u>)

#### Increased internet can have economic benefits

The World Bank states that increasing internet access in developing countries to 75% could boost their collective GDP by \$2 trillion and create 140 million new jobs, highlighting the economic advantages of broader internet access. (Source: *World Bank*, <u>LINK</u>)

#### NO

#### Will free access mean the same access?

Programmes or websites offering free internet access to selected services, like Facebook's Free Basics, have been criticised for violating net neutrality principles (allowing all internet users to use all of the internet in the same way) by limiting users to a curated selection of websites. Would we expect those who use the free access to only be able to access certain websites picked for financial benefit to the programme while people who choose to pay can have free access? (*Source: Utunnel, LINK*)

#### Even if it is free, there may be barriers preventing its use
