## Introduction



Welcome to Big Debate Club!

My name is Becky and today we are debating the question...

Should we stop buying fast fashion?

Buying nice clothes for a small price can always be a treat and with fast fashion, it makes it easier to buy lots of clothes cheaply. Fast fashion means producing cheap clothes at high volume and high speed so people can buy the latest styles without spending much.

Fast fashion makes style affordable, offers plenty of range especially for plus size options and also creates jobs. But fast fashion has downsides - it's bad for the environment, exploits workers, and encourages wasteful buying habits. So should we stop buying fast fashion? You decide.

## FOR: We should stop buying fast fashion


We're going to share reasons for both sides of the debate, then it's up to you to think of the rest!

### Producing so many clothes produces so much waste

You might be thinking that producing so many clothes leads to so much waste. According to the Ellen MacArthur Foundation, a truckload of clothing is burned or sent to landfill every second. Buying fewer, better-quality and longer lasting clothes means less waste piling up.

### The fast fashion industry exploits its workers

You could say that the fast fashion industry exploits its workers. A study by Human Rights Watch found that many fast fashion workers in countries like Bangladesh and Cambodia earn less than a living wage and face unsafe conditions - if we bought less, this would reduce demand and could pressure companies to improve working standards.

### Fast fashion means high water and resource usage

Producing just one cotton shirt can require up to 2,700 litres of water, which is enough drinking water for one person for over 2 years. The industry uses vast quantities of water and chemicals, polluting rivers and ecosystems in manufacturing regions. (Source: American Century Investments, [LINK](#))

## AGAINST: We should not stop buying fast fashion

Now let's change positions and consider why you might argue that we should not stop buying fast fashion.




### Fast fashion means affordability for everyone

You might think that fast fashion means affordability for everyone. A 2019 report highlighted that fast fashion offers low-cost clothing options for people who might not afford more expensive sustainable brands. Stopping it entirely could limit access to affordable clothing.

### Fast fashion provides so many jobs and opportunities

Or you could also say fast fashion provides so many jobs and opportunities. The International Labour Organization reports that clothes production provides jobs for over 60 million people worldwide, many of them women. A sudden stop could harm livelihoods in countries dependent on textiles.

### Fast fashion creates many jobs



The global apparel trade supports millions of jobs, from manufacturing in developing countries to selling the products in wealthier markets. Cheap production helps provide employment in regions where alternative work is limited. (Source: Cato Institute, [LINK](#))

## We should stop buying fast fashion

### ***Fast fashion creates massive environment damage***

### ***Fast fashion means high water and resource usage***

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### ***Fast fashion promotes a 'throw-away' culture***

Fast fashion promotes overconsumption. Garments are often worn only a few times before being discarded, as they are so easily accessible and therefore not treasured and thrown away as easily as they were bought. This creates a "throw-away" culture that harms the planet. (Source: *The Repurposing life*, [LINK](#))

## We should not stop buying fast fashion

### ***Stopping it reduces consumer choice and freedom***

Some argue that banning fast fashion would reduce consumer choice and unfairly penalise people for factors outside their control, especially when sustainable alternatives remain more expensive or less available. (Source: *Sustainable Fashion Forums*, [LINK](#))

### ***Fast fashion can create global trade and economic opportunity***

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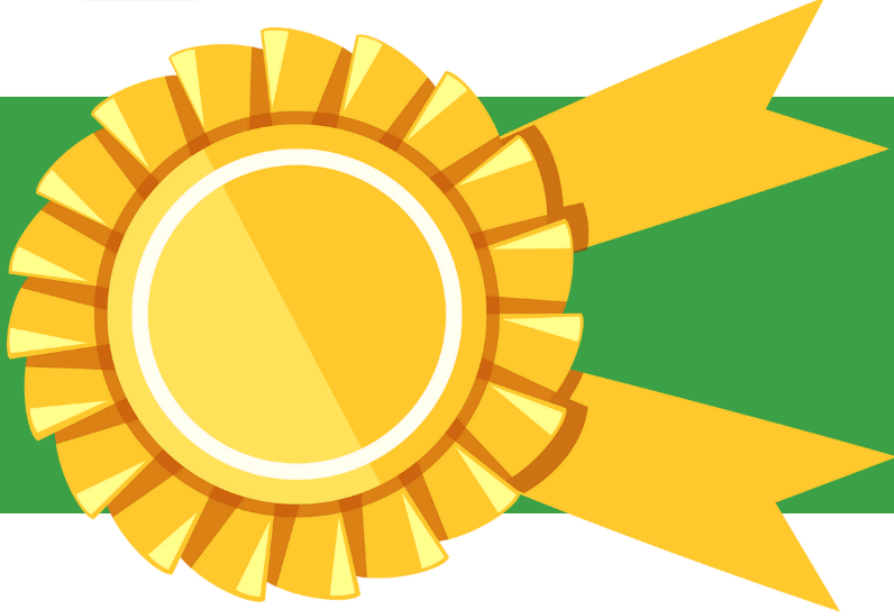

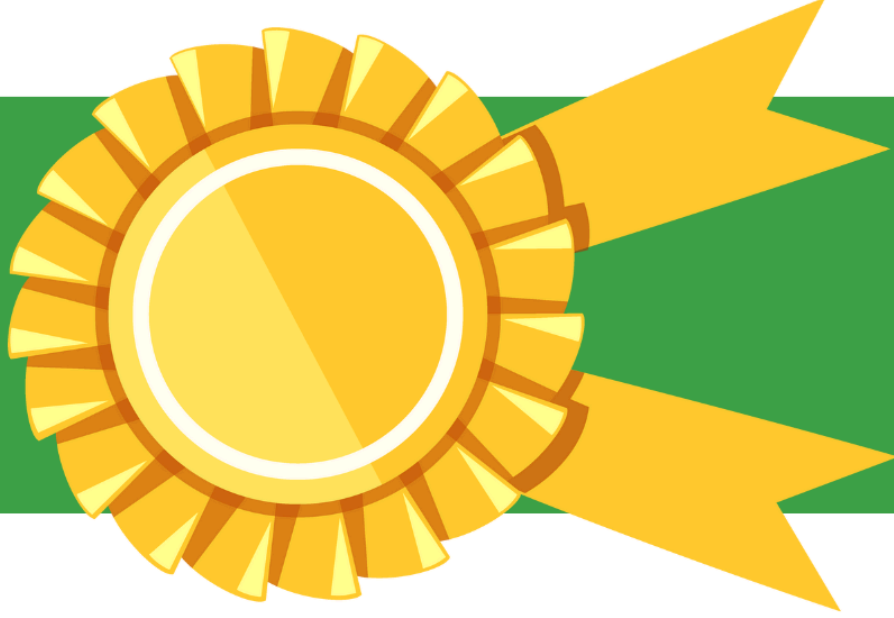
